ue Chung was majoring in business at the University of Illinois in Chicago until she had a dream one night that she was teaching in a third grade classroom. The next day, she switched her major. Sue's confidence in her vision started her on the path to a successful career in education. "I started off in the Chicago public schools. Right after I graduated I took a trip to Korea, and while there, my mom called me and said, "You have an interview, you need to come back sooner." I went to the interview, and I got a third grade position. Isn't that wild?"

After teaching in the Chicago public schools for 13 years Sue was fed up with all of the political mayhem and moved to an independent school. She didn't know much about independent schools and was pleasantly surprised with the opportunity to work in a supportive environment and build her own dynamic curriculum. "I found a iob at a private independent school which I'd never heard of before. It was a new world of possibility." Seven years in an independent school passed quickly but Sue wasn't sure if continuing to live in Chicago was the right option.

All Roads Lead to California

With her mom and brother living in southern California and her husband originally from northern California, she would visit the West Coast during vacations. On one of her visits while talking with her husband she said, "Why don't we move because we're here all the time? That was the revelation. We figured we'd both job search and see what happens. I started searching in southern California and I couldn't get any interviews, until I found CalWest."

question, I could go directly to them to get advice." She was able to meet with administrators and schedule school visits while at the Connection Event.

It wasn't easy for her to find a job right away. "CalWest was trying to help me find a position in southern California, and I even got a couple of interviews, but nothing was biting. My job search turned out to be about a 2 year process." One of Sue's goals was to be near her family in southern California but she realized it might be better to widen her search area.

The Mind Shift that Made the Difference

Talking with her Mother and realizing that her family would be glad to have her living closer to them in any part of California helped Sue feel more comfortable with opening her search to a wider region. She decided to aim for both the northern and southern areas of the state.

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Sue contacted CalWest about the change and they were able to set up additional interviews for her in a short period of time. "As soon as I decided that, in a few months, CalWest said they had a school that would like to interview me." Expanding her geographic area gave her access to more open positions. Embracing a New School Culture

Sue might have been new to some of the events and procedures of the school but she was confident enough to make sure to ask for help and advice from others when needed. "You're going to struggle, no matter what during your first year, because you try to figure out the ropes, but there are a lot of people around who will give you advice; all you have to do is communicate. My best advice is to make sure you communicate and ask for help, and try not to do everything on your own."

Pleased to have Made The Move

After teaching predominantly in Chicago, Sue Chung remained dedicated to her goal of working in an independent school in California.
